<p>Can Can't / Cannot</p> <p>Could Couldn't</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Lidia can paint beautiful landscapes. She could paint them when she was 5 years old. ▪ I can't do it because I'm not patient enough. ▪ Could you tell jokes when you were a kid? No I couldn't I was very shy.
<p>Can / Could Can't / Couldn't</p>	<p>} + SENSES (see, smell, hear, feel, taste, touch)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ I can feel free at the top of the mountain ▪ Can you see that? I can hear it from the distance
<p>BE ABLE TO – poder, ser capaz de</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Sometimes on Saturday night, Javi is not able to find his way home <p>*Future tense: Will can ☹ Will be able to ☺</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ By the end of the course, ALL the students in my class will be able to have an excellent conversation in English 	

Possibility about the present or future Puede que.../podría...	
<p>May May not Might Mightn't Could / Couldn't</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ I may come and visit you next summer ▪ We might be in the same English course, I met him in my school ▪ We should stay here for now because it could snow stronger later ▪ They look tired, they may not come to class today ▪ Don't cook any dinner for me, I might not be back in time

Should / Shouldn't Ought to (less frequent)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ You shouldn't work so hard ▪ They are in a row... should we go now? <p>The right thing to do...</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ We should / ought to do the housework instead of watching the movie now ▪ She should / ought to write her own answers instead of copying them from her partner.

OBLIGATION	PROHIBITION
<p>Must*– deber</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Are you crazy? You must stop here! ▪ You must hand in your reports on Monday ▪ You must be careful if you stay out late at night ▪ Must we stop writing now? <p>Have to - tener que (less strong than Must)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ I have to finish my homework for Monday ▪ I have to speak with him before he goes 	<p>Mustn't – no deber</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ You mustn't go in there – it says 'No entry'! ▪ You mustn't speak in the library – it's forbidden ▪ You mustn't use your mobile phone in class <p>Don't /Doesn't have to - no tener que</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ You don't have to use your phone to call Eli, she is over here.
<p>*You never use must in past tense: Musted ☹️ Be allowed to ☺️</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ We weren't allowed to speak during the B1 test but we were allowed to ask questions before the exam.
